## TERMS OF REFERENCE FOR INDIVIDUAL NATIONAL CONSULTANCY on IN-DEPTH STUDY ON ADOLESCENT BIRTH RATE BASED ON SISS 2018

TERMS OF REFERENCE (to be completed by Hiring Office)		
Hiring Office:	UNFPA, Mongolia Country Office	
Remuneration level:	Consultancy remuneration fee will be determined in accordance with UNFPA policies and procedures.	
Purpose and background of consultancy:	The Social Indicators Sample Survey (SISS) is conducted every five years by the National Statistical Office, supported by UNICEF and UNFPA. It is based on Multiple Indicators Cluster Survey methodology with inputs from other household surveys such as Demographic Health Survey (DHS) and Reproductive Health Survey (RHS). It has been conducted two times: in 2013 and 2018 respectively.	
	Adolescent birth rate (ABR) is defined as the annual number of live births to adolescent women per 1,000 adolescent women. ABR is also referred to as the age-specific fertility rate for women aged 15–19. High ABR is commonly associated with high proportion of unwanted pregnancies and reduced opportunities for young women to pursue education and careers; therefore, can lead to poverty and gender inequality. Globally, the likelihood of dying during pregnancy, childbirth and post-partum period is twice as high as that of a woman who waited until her 20s to begin childbearing.	
	Over the past decades, the ABR has decreased in most of countries in the world, including Asia and the Pacific region. However in Mongolia, the ABR, that was recorded at 40.4 per 1,000 girls aged 15-19 in the SISS 2013, has increased to 42.6 in the SISS 2018. A multitude of factors may have influenced this increase: economic growth, employment opportunities, government policies on education and health, failure of the family planning programme, and others. It has to be noted the total fertility rate (TFR) remained almost the same: 3.0 in 2013 and 2.9 in 2018.	
	The SISS questionnaire gathers a wealth of information that can be disaggregated by a number of biological (e.g. age or disability status), social (e.g. education or religion), economic (e.g. wealth) and geographic variables (e.g. urban/rural or by regions).	
	ABR is higher among women living in rural areas. In some places, it has even topped to 70 per 1,000 adolescents. Moreover, recent UNFPA mission revealed that ARB is higher in soums that provide schooling up to 9 <sup>th</sup> grade than that of	

	those offer 12 <sup>th</sup> grades of schooling. Internal migration of students aged 14 -15 years old might be one of the fundamental social factors of high ABR.
	As such, the purpose of the current consultancy is to provide in depth analysis of the factors influencing the increase of ABR using the SISS and routine health and education system databases in order to provide insight and recommendations which will be advocated for the Government of Mongolia (GoM) to be included in the national reproductive health programme and public health interventions, and feed into the formulation of the GoM and UNFPA Seventh Country Programme (2022-2026).
Scope of work:	Specific responsibilities of the National Consultant are as follows:

	<ul> <li>Conduct specific analysis of the factors influencing the fertility-related behavior of selected population groups such as young women, poor, herders, women and girls with disabilities, young women living in soums provide different level of schooling and etc.;</li> <li>Write a detailed report describing the methodology, findings and</li> </ul>
	evidence-based recommendations and linkages with the facts identified from country context analysis;
	Organize and facilitate a consultative workshop on findings and recommendations involving relevant stakeholders such as ministries, government agencies, health and research institutions, NGOs and development partners; and
	Ensure that the comments and feedback received from stakeholders during the consultative workshop are fully incorporated into the final report.
