## FOR DEVELOPMENT OF PRE-DEPARTURE PROGRAMME FOR SECONDARY SCHOOL GRADUATING STUDENTS IN UMNUGOBI PROVINCE

TERMS OF REFERENCE (to be completed by Hiring Office)	
Hiring Office:	United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA) Country Office, Mongolia.
Purpose and background of consultancy:	UNFPA Mongolia is hiring an Individual Consultant to design and develop Pre-departure programme for secondary school graduating students in Umnugobi province who are departing to provincial center and Ulaanbaatar for higher education studies.
	The purpose of the pre-departure programme is to provide them with better preparation for coping with the new environment. It will also concentrate on delivering comprehensive guidance on sexual and reproductive health services, social support services for adolescents as well as integrating with other programmes such as" career-day" programme.
	Pre-departure programme is a part of the whole cycle of the studying and is designed to reduce the vulnerability of adolescents and enable them to maximize benefits from outside of the hometown studies. The cycle begins with making a decision to study for higher education followed by leaving their home, arriving in a different soum or aimag, integrating into a new environment, and living and studying in different places. Thus, pre-departure programme should help adolescents to become informed and empowered for each phase.
	The United Nations 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and Programme of Action of the International Conference on Population and Development highlighted the need to improve health and wellbeing of adolescents and monitored through the indicator on adolescent birth rate (ABR) (SDG 3: Ensure healthy lives, promote wellbeing at all ages, and SDG 5: Achieve Gender Equality, and empower all women and girls).

Within Mongolia, there has been a rise in unmet need for family planning, and currently data confirm that the country is experiencing their highest level of ABR within the last 20 years (43 per 1,000 girls aged 15-19).

Particularly, Umnugobi region remains to be the highest within Mongolia. Currently the ABR stands at 61/1,000 girls.

There are targeted interventions aimed at reducing this high ABR to 20/1,000 by 2021 through the activities of the Integrated Support Programme (ISP) in Umnugobi province. The issues of lack of proper knowledge and access to family planning are particularly relevant to young people aged 15-24 years in rural areas, which can contribute to higher ABR.

In Mongolia, the secondary schooling is 12 years and it is mandatory for all. Schools in soums usually have boarding schools until 9<sup>th</sup> grade for students from countryside. Students graduating soum schools who want to complete secondary school have to attend schools in the aimag center. After graduating 9<sup>th</sup> grade, adolescents usually go to the provincial center to continue 10<sup>th</sup> grade or go to study at vocational training centers. Majority of them live by themselves, at relatives, at grandparents or in school dormitories, and many girls become pregnant while they study in the provincial center.

With support of UNFPA, NSO conducted a specific research into the factors and social determinants influencing adolescent pregnancy rates in Umnugobi province. A qualitative study findings show that girls who live in soums with 9 year schools are likely to get pregnant before age of 16 compared to those who live in soums with 12-year schools.

Taking into account the lessons learned from other countries in collaboration with information gathered throughout this activity, the outcome of this qualitative study is to develop the key recommendations including pre-departure orientation programme in line with the specific needs of the target population to achieve a reduction of ABR.

Accordingly, UNFPA aims to address this issue at grass root level by implementing pre-departure programme for secondary school graduating students who are the most vulnerable and affected group in these circumstances. Through the programme, participants are expected to be physically and mentally prepared for their new journey in life and settlement in urban area by strengthening their coping skills and independency, and gaining knowledge and consciousness to protect themselves from unintended developments.

Thus, an individual consultant will provide technical and methodological assistance to UNFPA's Integrated Support Programme (ISP) team on the development of pre-departure programme planned to be implemented in July 2020 in Umnugobi province as part of ISP.

	Scope of work:  (Description of services, activities, or outputs)	The ISP aims to address the critical and emerging health and social issues in Umnugobi Province: sexual and reproductive health of women, adolescents and youth; youth empowerment; and gender-based violence. Accordingly, the "Pre-departure Programme" will contribute to the programme Outcome 4 and Output 4.2: Communication on women's, adolescent and youth health issues.  With this Terms of Reference, UNFPA is looking for a national consultant who will work closely with UNFPA's ISP team and respective authorities of Umnugobi Aimag Governor's Office.  The selected consultant will complete the following tasks:  A. Development of the pre-departure programme structure and design;  1. In close consultation with local authorities and UNFPA's ISP team, design the programme  B. Piloting of the pre-departure programme in select soums;  1.
